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About Transition Bristol

Transition Bristol is run by volunteers and acts as a hub for a network of Transition Neighbourhoods across the city. It is working to raise awareness of Climate Change and Peak Oil and the impacts both will have on our lives.

Transition Bristol is not offering the solution – rather it believes that there are many solutions and that the skills, knowledge, creativity and experience of the community is where they can be found. The aim: to

end up with an Energy Descent Action Plan - a timetabled, well thought out plan for Bristol's transition from an energy dependent system to a locally resilient, sustainable, productive and vibrant city. By decreasing dependency on fossil fuels this could be an opportunity to create a better standard of living than we have now, where community is more important than consuming.

There are ten **Transition Neighbourhoods**, including SusWot - community led local initiatives.

Clean Energy Cashback

Is the new name for the Feed in Tariffs scheme that will pay 41.3p for every unit of electricity produced by a Photovoltaic solar system. An investment of £10,000-12,000 will amount to a return of around 8-10% for the guaranteed 25 years of the scheme. This will be continued by the new coalition Government. The system, with no moving parts is maintenance free and the panels are estimated to have a life of 50 to 60 years. Planning permission is now much easier unless you live in a listed building. UV radiation, rather than sunshine, provides the energy and the South West is the best region in the UK, so living in Westbury-on-Trym has another advantage.

The capital outlay required is $\overline{}$ For more information visit quite considerable for many

people. As sales of cells increase prices will fall. There are advances in technology using electronic inks that are likely to reduce the cost of converting the solar energy.

However, the scheme reduces the 41.3 pence paid back each year as installation costs should be lower.
